#### IV. Discussion

A. <u>Master Syllabi</u> – Committee Chair John Hagood would like to look at what we are asking units to submit to UCC as syllabi. The current syllabus format does not specify what the UCC is looking at and scrutinizing for the courses. A master syllabi would allow the units to give multi-sectioned courses enough information about the course to give guidance for those teaching it, but not dictate how it be taught.

Blase Scarnati offered to work with John Hagood on the format and bring it back to the committee in November for review.

B. By Laws and Committee Composition – The UCC does not have official guidelines as to what the composition of the committee is to be. The Senate does not believe they need to dictate the number of people on UCC but that it should be what UCC believes it should be. The UCC would like a statement for guidance from the Faculty Senate. Blase Scarnati will speak with the Senate President to discuss this item. Ron Pitt and John Hagood are going to look at the UCC Policies and Procedures and bring a draft back to the committee. Members of the UCC would also like to see the responsibilities of the members listed, as well as repercussions for non-attendance by

members. It was also suggest that Policies and Procedures be separate documents.

Course Description: This class builds on the material and methods concepts for residential construction introduced in CM 123. It begins with a review of fundamentals of performance of materials and assemblies, introduces students to an overview of how commercial construction projects are conceived, constructed, and managed. Students are introduced to the functions and dynamics of the Project Team; and based on a systems approach, introduced to the materials and methods common to commercial construction projects. The course provides the introduction and base knowledge of the main building construction systems that are explored in detail in further classes in construction management program including: CM 220 - Introduction to Structures, CM 224 - Concrete Systems, CM 225 -Masonry, CM 321 – Structural Steel Systems, and CM 360 Soil Mechanics.

#### **Student Learning Expectations/Outcomes:**

By the end of the course, you should be able to:

- 1. Identify the major and minor components of a commercial building (acronyms/definitions/vocabulary intensive).
- 2. Identify and classify different commercial construction systems including: foundation system options, concrete and steel frame systems, curtain wall systems, roofing systems, thermal and moisture protection systems, finish systems, and environmental and energy systems. (knowledge of commercial construction materials, methods and details).

The Early Childhood Certificate was created to help students meet the requirements of the Arizona Department of Education's early childhood endorsement. Now that ADE is approving student coursework for the State Early Childhood Endorsement, we are finding the need to make changes for better alignment. There have also been some decisions made to remove courses that are on the current Early Childhood Certificate. (1) We are no longer offering ECI 320 (Early Childhood Curriculum) and are offering ECI 312 (Early Childhood Curriculum & Assessment) and ECI 313 (Classroom Management in Early Childhood Education) in its place. These classes better meet the state requirements for curriculum, assessment, and classroom management. (2) The State requires coursework in various subject areas, so ECI 314 (Early Childhood Mathematics) and ECI 315 (Early

Childhood Science & Social Studies) have been added for this purpose. (FYI...Early Literacy is covered in the Elementary Education Program. (3) ECI 408 is being replaced with ECI 308 because ECI 308 is attached to ECI 312. (4) The special education requirement in the State endorsement is met through a course in the Elementary Education degree (ESE 380) and does not need to be repeated in the certificate. (5) Many of the class choices have been removed to ensure that students take classes that directly align with the State's endorsement in early childhood.

#### MAT 185: Functions, Applications, and Explorations

**Course Description**: This course is an in-depth study of topics in secondary school mathematics. Emphasis is on modeling with linear, exponential, trigonometric, and logistic functions: curve fitting; discrete and continuous models. Other topics include parametric and polar equations, linear and matrix algebra, regression aspects of statistics, and growth and decay exponential models.

#### Student Learning Expectations/Outcomes for this Course:

Students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a depth of knowledge of functions ranging from algebra through calculus.
- 2. Demonstrate a depth of content knowledge with regard to important secondary mathematics topics such as parametric relations, polar relations, matrices, exponential and logarithmic functions, vectors, and complex numbers.
- 3. Work with relevant data and use regression, matrices, function patterns, and systems methods to model the data.
- 4. Present mathematical ideas and topics in a knowledgeable and effective manner.
- 5. Demonstrate proficiency in the use of technology in the mathematics classroom.
- 6. Identify mathematics content connections between the various levels of secondary mathematics curriculum and between secondary and university level curriculum.

Course Structure/Approach: The course consists of four units: 1) Functions, 2) Modeling, 3) Overlooked Topics and Explorations, and 4) Geometry of Complex Numbers. In this course, students engage in explorations and lab activities designed to strengthen and expand their knowledge of the topics that are traditionally glossed over by secondary teachers but essential for preparing students for university mathematics courses. The course is designed to include and promote methods of discovery, problem-solving, collaboration, and presentation of results.

Textbook and Required Materials: None. Materials will be provided by the NAUTeach Program.

**Unit 1: Functions:** Topics include types of functions and their characteristics; using derivatives to identify features of functions such as relative extrema, zeros, concavity; applications of functions; connections between functions and other mathematics topics.

**Unit 2: Modeling:** Topics include modeling data with functions; regression and residuals; and modeling functions with matrices.

**Unit 3: Overlooked Topics and Explorations:** Topics include parametric models; derivatives of parametric models; polar coordinates; exponential and logistic models as differential equations; vectors; and applications of these

**Unit 4: Geometry of Complex Numbers:** Topics include the geometry of complex numbers; polar complex numbers; Euler's formula and Taylor series; and applications of complex numbers.

GCS 350: Managing Grand Canyon National Park

Grand Canyon Semester: Fall 2009

Course Co-requisite: Enrollment in Grand Canyon Semester

#### Course Description

This course will focus on the management of Grand Canyon National Park and its role in the development of the West; we will investigate the image and reality of the role the park and the National Park Service have played in this process. We will look at the history and mission of the National Park Service and the specific management objectives and challenges of Grand Canyon National Park. Through the assigned readings and presentations by various park staff and others, we will look at park planning and management as well as how we manage the park's natural and cultural resources. Through an activity called "Park as Text" we will explore in small groups the entire park community, including the gateway community of Tusayan, to discover non-Park Service perspectives of the park. The time at the canyon will include a hike into the canyon as well as along the rim.

To continue our learning experience we will go on a river trip down the Colorado River through Grand Canyon; the trip will be multiple days. We will have "class sessions" on the beaches and up the side canyons of the river corridor as well as participate on a park research project as a service component of our program. Our boatmen/guides will be both National Park Service staff and professionals with many years of experience, each with their own area of expertise.

#### Course Outcomes

At the end of the semester, students are expected to be able to:

- 1. Understand the history and development of Grand Canyon National Park.
- 2. Analyze and discuss the relationship between the image of GCNP and the realities managers face.
- 3. Critically engage, from a variety of disciplinary perspectives, issues and management objectives at GCNP.
- 4. Analyze and discuss issues related to the management of the Colorado River through GCNP.
- 5. Creatively reflect on the personal experience of GCNP and the Colorado River.

#### Grading and Assessment

There will be five assignments that will make up your grade:

- Park Scavenger Hunt (5%)
- Park as Text, small group activity with presentation (15%)
- On River Presentation (15%)
- Summary of River Trip experience, creative presentation (25%)
- Final essay (40%)

#### Written Assignments

#### On River Presentation

This is a short 10 to 15 minute presentation to be given on the river at a relevant spot related to your topic. We will provide a list of topics from which you will select the topic of your presentation. We will need to know your selection by the end of your stay at the rim so that we can plan accordingly on the river. By the end of your stay at the park, September  $27^{th}$ , you will be required to turn in a one-page summary and outline of your presentation. We will take a notebook along on the river with all of the outlines so that you will have access to it.

#### River Trip Experience

This is to be a personal piece, a reflection of your experience on the Colorado River through Grand Canyon. It is an opportunity to express your personal connection, or non-connection, to the river, whether spiritual, emotional, aesthetical or whatever. It is to be a creative piece that can take any form you choose, e.g., artwork (painting, drawing, collection of drawings, etc.), an essay, poetry, photo journal, written journal, musical, ... whatever you choose. If you chose to do a creative piece such as art work, you will need to include a short written explanation of the piece and its relevance to your experience. Your grade for this assignment will be based 90% on content and 10% on the quality of your presentation.

#### Final Essay "Grand Canyon National Park: Image vs. Reality"

This too is a reflective, personal piece contrasting your image of Grand Canyon National Park and the National Park Service prior to your visit, and what has become a reality for you. In the essay you will clearly state the image(s) you had of the Park Service and of Grand Canyon National Park; you will then state the reality and clearly explain what it was that either supported your original image or changed it. Your final essay should be a minimum of 1200 words and a maximum of 2400 words.

Although you arrive at the park on September 22<sup>nd</sup>, classroom activities will begin Sunday afternoon September 23<sup>rd</sup>; this will allow you a couple of days prior to classes to explore the park and complete the Park Scavenger Hunt activity. The IRB meets once each month. Proposals must be submitted for review at least fifteen working days before the monthly meeting. You should consult with your course instructor early in the course to ascertain if your project needs to be reviewed by the IRB and/or to secure information or appropriate forms and procedures for the IRB review. Your instructor and department chair or college dean must sign the application for approval by the IRB. The IRB categorizes projects into three levels depending on the nature of the project: exempt from further review, expedited review, or full board review. If the IRB certifies that a project is exempt from further review, you need not resubmit the project for continuing IRB review as long as there are no modifications in the exempted procedures.

#### Academic Integrity

#### Student Learning Expectations/outcomes for this Course

THIS COURSE IS DESIGNED TO GIVE A STUDENT AN OVERVIEW OF PHOTOJOURNALISM AND INTRODUCE SHOOTING AND EDITING FUNDAMENTALS THAT WILL BE EMPLOYED THROUGHOUT THE STUDENT'S PHOTOJOURNALISM STUDIES AND INTERNSHIPS AT NAU.

#### COURSE PURPOSE / DESCRIPTION

This course is offered in direct cooperation and partnership with the National Outdoor Leadership School and Leave-No-Trace Center for Outdoor Ethics (the Center) to meet all established national curriculum standards for LNT Master Educator Certification. Students will learn to teach minimum impact outdoor ethics and upon successful completion, be able to lead Leave-No-Trace Trainer courses and Awareness Workshops. The course will include a required four night backpacking trip in a wilderness setting.

#### COURSE GOALS / OBJECTIVES

The goals are five-fold:

- 1) To strive for consistent, quality training for all Leave No Trace course participants;
- 2) To provide an easily implemented training structure that encourages training efforts:
- 3) To establish a structure that allows the Leave No Trace Center for Outdoor Ethics (the Center) to track and quantify training efforts;
- 4) To clarify the role of the Center in regard to training institutions and individual Master Educators and Trainers:
- 5) To identify that there are inherent risks in outdoor activities and to discuss warnings and other information pertaining to Leave No Trace courses.

#### ORGANIZATIONS OFFERING MASTER EDUCATOR COURSES

The Center's Educational Review Committee oversees Leave No Trace training efforts, curriculum development, and material production. The ERC also serves as the institution that approves organizations interested in conducting Leave No Trace Master courses. The ERC reviews and selects interested organizations (such as NAU) offering Master courses by majority vote, pursuant to the guidelines outlined below.

Organizations selected to offer and conduct Leave No Trace Master Educator courses must comply with the Leave No Trace/Organization Training Agreement - Master and Trainer Courses and follow the Guidelines included here. This includes:

- a. Possessing appropriate levels of insurance;
- b. Assuring that staff of that organization, including any proposed Leave No Trace instructors or co-instructors, are appropriately trained in outdoor leadership/instruction skills, and maintain appropriate levels of emergency medical certification;
- c. Distributing the Leave No Trace introduction and discussion of course risks form;
- d. Following the "Core Components for Master Educator or Training Course Curriculum," and following additional Guidelines for courses outlined below, in any course;

e. Using the ERC-approved Master Educator curriculum with consideration to existing copyrights.

### CURRICULUM CONTENT

A Leave No Trace Master Educator Certification course emphasizes skills and techniques essential to Leave No Trace minimum impact outdoor ethics and education. As stated in the Introduction above, Leave No Trace courses do not teach basic travel, camping or other outdoor skills, nor do they provide outdoor instructor certification. A Leave No Trace Master course includes a minimum of four eight-hour days and at least three nights camping in the field.

### CORE COMPONENTS FOR MASTER COURSE CURRICULUM

- 1. Review of the role of Leave No Trace Master Educator.
- 2. Discussion and practice of the principles and ethics of Leave No Trace.
- 3. Discussion of the Leave No Trace trainer concept and Training Guidelines.
- 4. Overview of recreation ecology and types of resource and social impacts.
- 5. Discussion of Leave No Trace teaching skills and techniques, student learning styles and development of lesson plans.
- 6. Development of a Leave No Trace action plan.
- 7. At least one student led teaching exercise by each participant.
- 8. Focus on interactive and hands-on field experiences.
- 9. Review of the mission and need for the Leave No Trace program.
- 10. A historical overview of the Leave No Trace program.
- 11. Discussion of the role, function and administrative structure of the federal land management agencies' Leave No Trace programs.
- 12. Overview of the role, function and administrative structure of the Center for Outdoor Ethics.

### MASTER COURSE COMPLETION

Upon successful completion of a Leave No Trace Master course, each participant will become a Master of Leave No Trace and receive a completion certificate from the Center/course provider. Successful completion of the course requires participation in all course activities and teaching exercises. Those who complete the Master course are equipped to:

- Understand, demonstrate and teach state of the art minimum impact outdoor techniques, with the ability to train others as Trainers;
- Lead a discussion on outdoor ethics and help others explore and define their own personal outdoor ethic;
- Develop and share an action plan for teaching the public about Leave No Trace.

All participants of a Leave No Trace Master course shall be asked to complete a course evaluation form, copies of which will be submitted to the Center. The Center reserves the right to deny a Master completion certificate if in the eyes of both instructors, the participant has not 1) attended the entire course; 2) displayed the skills necessary to train Trainers, conduct outreach programs or otherwise carry forward the Leave No Trace message in a productive way; 3) exhibited behavior consistent with the Leave No Trace philosophy.

### COURSE GRADING

This course / certification is being offered through NAU only as a Pass / Fail option. Upon course completion all students who have properly enrolled for credit through the NAU Registrar's Office, and met the qualifications of certification as an LNT Master Educator, will receive a passing grade for the course.

### SAMPLE COURSE ITINERARY

This course will be heading to a remote North Rim region of the Grand Canyon and venturing into Kanab Creek Wilderness (USFS) for the field portion (days #2 through 5) of this 5-day course.

8 to noon - Introductions, Positive Learning Environment, Course Expectations and more...

- Break for LUNCH

1 to ~3pm - Course structuring, Teaching Techniques, and LNT Principle #1...

3 to ~5pm - Gear Issue (if needed), Gear & Food Checks, and trip logistics and route overview...

### Day #2

- Early am departure for Kanab Creek Wilderness - exact time TBA

- Travel by Van to Jump-Up trailhead (4 to 5 hours)

- Lunch, a short hiking day (a few miles tops), mixed with 2 or 3, 20-minute participant LNT presentations & feedback sessions.

- Dinner, Debrief, LNT evening activity, enjoy the scenery

### Day #3

- Breakfast, Break Camp, Hike

- Lunch, a bit longer hiking day, again mixed with 3 or 4, 20-minute participant LNT presentations & feedback sessions.

- Dinner, Evening LNT / Ethics Discussion

### Day #4

- Breakfast, Break Camp, Hike

- Lunch, a longer hiking day, again mixed with 3 or 4, 20-minute participant LNT presentations & feedback sessions (presentations should be completed)

- Dinner, Action Plan introductions

### Day #5

- Early Breakfast, Break Camp, Hike

- A shorter hiking day, Lunch @ trailhead or likely on the road...

- Return to Flagstaff, deissue any checked out gear, LNT Action Plans Workshop, Participant Action Plan Presentations, and Graduation.

### STUDENT HEALTH INSURANCE

### **BOOT NOTES...**

Boots are the single most expensive item that you may need to purchase for the backcountry portion of the class. It is essential that you get the appropriate boot with a proper fit. Keep the following items in mind with regard to your boots:

- -Hiking type "approach shoes" are inappropriate for this course; YOU WILL NEED A BOOT THAT COMES ABOVE THE ANKLE.
- -You will be carrying between 40-55 pounds of equipment/food/water. You will need a medium to heavy duty boot with a fairly stiff sole. Protect your ankles - wear a good boot.
- -\*\*Super Important\*\* Your boots must fit properly, assure that the boot is roomy enough to: 1) avoid "toe-bang" while hiking downhill, and 2) allow for end of the day foot swelling from carrying heavy packs.
- -You may choose to wear 2 pairs of socks with your boots, such as a wool sock and a liner or 2 wool socks. Fit your boots with the socks set-up you plan on using in the field.
- -Boot toes and uppers should be solid enough to afford protection against rocks, stones, and cactus spines.

As it stands, photojournalism emphasis students are not getting into a photojournalism classes until their junior--sometimes senior--year. This is too late to offer them the opportunity to compete with students from top photojournalism schools for jobs and valuable

internships. PHO 28% puts photojournalism emphasis students on track early in their academic career and gives them the experience needed to compile strong portfolios which allows them to compete for those good jobs and internships. Without this early start, our students will likely fail in the market.
