## FOREWORD

In December 1994, the Arizona Board of Regents established the Institute for Native Americans at Northern Arizona University. It also established a twelve-member Advisory Board that meets twice a year to advise the Institute Director and the University President on the needs and opportunities for Native Americans. The University President appoints the Board members from across the state many of who are tribally elected leaders.

It is the Institute's mission to enhance the visibility and standing of on-going programs, both academic and service oriented that relate to Native Americans, their culture, issues and future prospects. Secondly, it serves as a catalyst and coordinating body for new initiatives that relate to Native Americans.

The Institute works with the Advisory Board in reaching out to communities statewide and the region. The Institute publishes the handbook periodically to inform the stakeholders but more importantly reach out to students, parents and legislators. The Institute communicates NAU opportunities to Indian nations. It serves as a catalyst and coordinating body for these existing and new initiatives that are academic and service oriented by articulating them to the university expertise and resources. It develops the infra-structure that supports this communication and development. It works closely with the Commission for Native Americans, commissioners appointed by the President, in generating new opportunities and advising and working with the President on these developments. It takes advantage of the unique history of the University by promoting its appreciation for the native history and cultures of the surrounding communities. It serves as the umbrella for the internal and external communication and coordination with tribal constituents, students, faculty, and staff.

President, Dr. John Haeger, continues to reaffirms the University goal *to be recognized as a national leader in providing educational opportunities for Native American students and service to Native American tribes*. To this end, the Commission for Native Americans embraces this goal and is working with the President, deans, chairs, faculty, staff and students across campus to make this a reality. Furthermore, the Commission and President is actively engaging in finding creative and successful ways in meeting this goal that includes recruiting and retaining Native American students, faculty and staff.

To do this USEPA is considering the promulgation of national core water quality standards that tribes would have the option to adopt based on their needs. It is intended that the core standards would be on

an interim basis until tribes develop and achieve their own water quality standards. The need for self-generated technical capacity and the obligation to fulfill regulatory responsibility demonstrate the need to provide tribes with specific capabilities through technical training, education and professional development.

treatment, referrals, and tests includes: ACCUPLACER, ACT, SAT, CLEP, GRE, TOEFL, MCAT, LSAT, MAT, and GMAT. All NAU enrolled students are eligible for a free consultation with a counselor. Testing services and on-going counseling have cost attached.

## AGREEMENTS & PARTNERSHIPS

### **Lawrence Livermore National Laboratories (LLNL) — Livermore, California**

A memorandum of agreement between the University of California Lawrence Livermore National Laboratories, the Arizona Board of Regents, and Northern Arizona University to coordinate the scientific, technical, and creative talents and resources of LLNL and NAU to enhance recruitment, participation, and training of Native Americans, other minorities, and female students in science, engineering, computer systems, energy, and environmental and technology programs. The MOA was signed on October 14, 1992, by Dr. Eugene M. Hughes, NAU President, and Mr. Phillip E. Coyle, III, LLNL Principal Laboratory Associate Director and witnessed by Governor Fife Symington of Arizona.

### **Diné College — Tsaile, Arizona**

The memorandum of agreement between the Arizona Board of Regents for and on behalf of Northern Arizona University and Diné College, a post-secondary educational institution chartered by the Navajo Nation to maximize their educational resources and expertise to increase educational opportunities within the Navajo Nation, preserve the integrity and autonomy of each institution, permitting each institution to fulfill effectively its own mission; and deliver jointly selective programs of higher education instruction and education related services and to provide a cost-effective educational delivery system on the Navajo Nation. The MOA was signed on April 20, 1999, by Dr. Clara M. Lovett, NAU President; Dr. Tommy Lewis, Diné College President, and witnessed by Kelsey Begaye, Navajo Nation President, and Andy R. Ayze, Chairperson of Navajo Nation Education Committee.

**Navajo Nation Division of Diné Education of the Navajo Nation Council — Window Rock, Arizona**

The resolution of the Navajo Nation Division of Diné Education of the Navajo Nation Council to regulate all post-secondary education programs and courses offered on the Navajo Nation by off-Navajo Nation post-secondary institutions, including upper division and graduate academic and vocational programs. The resolution to allow NAU to offer courses on the Navajo Nation was signed on April 17, 1998, by Leonard Chee, Chairperson, Navajo Nation Education Committee, motioned by Julia M. Mose, and seconded by Emerson Jackson, and passed by a vote of 5 in favor, 0 opposed and 1 abstained.
