About Parent and Family Services

What is the Office of Parent and Family Services?

The Office of Parent and Family Services was established in recognition of the essential role that parents and guardians play in the success of their student. Our mission is to enhance the quality of both the student and parent experience. www.nau.edu/parents

What is the purpose of Parent and Family Services?

- ✓ To advance the mission and goals of the university through the establishment and maintenance of contact between the university and the parents of its students.
- ✓ To provide a medium through which parents of current students can develop an interest in the progress and needs of the university, can contribute to the well-being of the university and can foster beneficial relations among its members and the university.
- ✓ To support the university administration in fostering and encouraging exemplary scholarship by our students.

What types of services does the Office of Parent and Family provide?

Academics at Northern Arizona University

How does my student enroll in classes?

Enrollment for classes is accomplished through LOUIE (Lumberjack Online University Information Environment), our on-line student information system: www.nau.edu/louie. First year students have academic advising holds on their accounts and will not be able to enroll without first meeting with an advisor. Academic advising meetings are built in to your student’s Orientation schedule. Your student and the academic advisor will discuss your student’s academic progress and plan a course schedule designed to meet academic goals.

What is Liberal Studies?

Liberal Studies is our general education program. It is designed to provide students with the essential skills and understandings necessary for life at and after the university. Thirty-five units of liberal studies are required. In addition, there are two university requirements – a junior level writing course and the senior capstone experience. The university also has a diversity requirement, one class focused on the ethnic diversity of the United States and one class focused on the diversity of our larger world.

What library resources are available to my student?

The Cline Library is the keystone of academic life on campus. The library includes more than 1,400,000 volumes, including 560,000 books; 240,000 government documents; 35,000 maps; 373,000 microforms; 18,000 sound recordings; 10,000 videos, films and other non-print media; and 136,000 bound periodical volumes. www.nau.edu/library

Will I see my student's grades or be advised of my student's progress on a regular basis?

No. In 1974, Congress passed the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA, also known as the Buckley Amendment), which states that a student is the custodian of his or her educational records. This means that even if you are paying the tuition, representatives of Northern Arizona University cannot disclose or discuss anything with you about your student's academic or disciplinary status without written authorization from the student. Federal law does not permit school officials to share students' educational records with anyone else unless it is in compliance with a lawfully issued subpoena or on an internal educational need-to-know basis. E-mailed authorizations are not acceptable. www.nau.edu/enrollmentservices/ferpa.asp

Midterm grade reports are available to your student via LOUIE and final term grades are available within two weeks after the end of the term. Please be aware of these time frames so you and your student can discuss his or her academic progress.

Academic Support

Are there tutoring services available on campus for my student?

Yes. There are two Learning Assistance Centers on campus and each provides a variety of FREE academic assistance services to students. Contact North LAC at 523-5524, and South LAC at 523-7391 or www.nau.edu/lac.

What is Supplemental Instruction (SI)?

SI is a series of weekly review sessions for students taking historically difficult courses. Attendance at sessions is voluntary. Students will be guided through material by SI leaders, who have previously taken the course. www.nau.edu/lac

Are there resources to assist my student with writing?

Yes! The Writing Center provides students with an opportunity for close contact with a supportive yet critical audience. Tutors will work with students on any part of the writing process from pre-writing to revising to working on theses and dissertations. www.cal.nau.edu/english/writing_center.asp

Computing on Campus

Who can my student call for technical help with his/her computer?

The Academic Computing Help Desk (ACHD) is our designated technical support group for students. The help desk can be contacted by calling (928) 523-9294, 888-520-7215 (toll-free) or by e-mail at help@nau.edu.

What is “LOUIE?”

Northern Arizona University students use LOUIE, Lumberjack’s On-line University Information Environment, to access information from the university’s Student Information System about themselves and their academic progress.

LOUIE users can:

- ✓ Verify and update their local and permanent addresses
- ✓ Check their class schedule
- ✓ View their midterm (fall and spring terms only) and final grades
- ✓ Access their academic transcript
- ✓ See their Degree Progress report
- ✓ Initiate a “What If” request to Degree Progress to learn how classes they have completed would apply toward a different major
- ✓ Register for classes
- ✓ Use the “Course Search” feature, which indicates what courses are scheduled and sorts them by whether or not they are still open, and also allows users to search for courses that meet specific Liberal Studies requirements, courses that meet at a certain time, etc.
- ✓ Request an official transcript and enrollment verification
- ✓ Check on a financial aid award
- ✓ View their account balance

LOUIE can be accessed at: www.nau.edu/louie. To enter the system, students are required to provide their student user ID and login password.

Emergencies

What does my student do if there is a medical emergency?

If there is a life-threatening emergency on campus, please call (928) 523-3000. Off campus, students should dial 911.

What if my student needs to leave school during the term for an extended period of time or for the rest of the term?

Contact the Office of Student Life at (928) 523-5181 as soon as possible. Staff members are available to assist students who are experiencing difficulties or a personal crisis. They are able to help contact faculty members, refer students to appropriate resources, and help determine a course of action so students can continue making academic progress.

If I have general concerns about my student, who should I call?

The Office of Parent and Family Services number is a great place to start. Our staff is familiar with the university and will be able to answer your questions or direct you to the appropriate office. Call (928) 523-6267.

Does the university ever close for weather or emergencies?

Classes may be canceled for weather-related issues or emergencies. Class cancellation and closure notices are sent through NAU Alert www.nau.edu/naualert. Students can call (928) 523-0007 to learn about cancellations and closures.

Health on Campus

What if my student is sick and has to miss a class?

Students should contact their instructors directly if they cannot attend class due to illness.

What services are available if my student becomes ill?

The Fronske Health Center provides comprehensive outpatient services to all currently enrolled students. Fronske is a full-service, professional medical facility including lab, X-ray, nursing, health education, and some specialty care. Many, if not all, of your student's primary care needs can be met on campus.

Is there a hospital in Flagstaff?

The Flagstaff Medical Center (FMS) is located at 1200 North Beaver Street. Since 1936, FMC, a member of Northern Arizona Healthcare, has provided high quality healthcare services to residents and visitors to northern Arizona. www.flagstaffmedicalcenter.com or (928) 779-3366.

What kinds of services are offered by the Counseling Center?

The Counseling Center offers counseling for individuals, couples, or in groups of students who are working on similar issues. In the first meeting, the counselor will help the student determine the type and frequency of services that will be most helpful; sometimes a referral off-campus is made. A counselor is available 24 hours a day for psychological emergencies at (928) 523-2261. Services are confidential with the exception of risk of harm to self or others, child or elder abuse, and some legal and emergency situations. www.nau.edu/ctc/

Life on Campus

HOUSING

What is Northern Arizona University's live-in policy?

Students are not required to live on campus. Students have found, however, that campus living is convenient and affordable. Research from around the country continues to identify residence hall living as a primary factor in improving student retention and satisfaction with the university experience.

What is a Learning Community?

Learning Communities (LC) bring together a cluster of students living in a residence hall who share a common academic major or area of interest. The value of a Learning Community is its ability to provide a strong bridge between faculty, staff, and students. <http://home.nau.edu/reslife/>

What academic resources do the residence halls provide?

The residence halls provide a variety of academic initiatives to help students succeed. Because a large amount of learning occurs outside of the classroom, our goal is for students to become better learners through their interactions with the following programs:

- ✓ Resource Centers - in our freshman halls where free tutoring and quiet study areas are offered.
- ✓ Study Rooms - throughout the residence halls where students can find solitude.
- ✓ Student and Staff Connections - in the area of academics to help students succeed.
- ✓ Programming - for all residents in the time management, test taking, study tips and other subjects.
- ✓ Residential Environments - combining a fun community and academic support under one roof.

What should my student do if there are roommate issues?

Your student should talk first with the resident assistant (RA). These trained staff members work to help students find ways to resolve issues. If problems persist, your student should talk with the Residence Hall Director (RHD). Contact the Office of Residence Life at (928) 523-3978.

What is NAU's policy regarding alcohol in the residence halls?

Students under the legal age of 21 are not permitted to possess or consume alcohol in university residence halls. The use or possession of alcoholic beverages or alcohol beverage containers in a substance free/alcohol free building is prohibited. On-campus possession of alcoholic beverages of those of legal age (21) will be allowed only in residence hall rooms of those who are of legal age. It is illegal for those of legal drinking age to provide alcohol to any person under 21 years of age.

DINING

What types of meal plans are available for students?

All freshmen living on campus are required to purchase a meal plan. Students may choose one of three options: 10 meals per week, 14 meals per week or 19 meals per week. A 10 meal-per-week meal plan will be assigned to any freshman living on campus who does not select a plan. Transfer students, returning students and those living off campus may choose from any of the above options as well as semester plans, block plans or Dining Dollars only plans. www.nau.edu/dining

Does Northern Arizona University's "pledge" apply to meal plans?

Yes, meal plans come with a two year price guarantee. In other words, students who purchase a meal plan this year will be guaranteed the current rates for the following year as well, no surprises, no guessing.

CAMPUS INVOLVEMENT AND ACTIVITIES

How do new students get involved in student organizations and activities?

The Office of Student Life has information on approximately 200 recognized student clubs and organizations on campus. Opportunities include service and special interest organizations, political groups, professional and departmental organizations, sports and recreational clubs, programming and activities, religious organizations, Greek organizations, and honoraries. www.nau.edu/stulife.

Can you tell me more about the fraternities and sororities on campus?

There are eight national sororities and fourteen national fraternities at NAU. Greek organizations offer students a world of opportunities to develop their leadership abilities, enhance their academic skills, and participate in service and fund-raising efforts. Greeks donate a significant amount of time and money each year to organizations such as the Children's Miracle Network, the American Cancer Society, Ronald McDonald House, the American Red Cross, United Way, the Salvation Army, and the Head Start program. Are students involved in the shared governance structure at the university?

Student voices and concerns are important at Northern Arizona University. Students serve as representatives at the highest levels of institutional governance, including the Arizona Board of Regents. The Associated Students of Northern Arizona University (ASNAU) serves as the student government on campus. ASNAU has a strong history of electing talented student leaders who represent student concerns and issues to the administration.

Diversity on Campus

What is the LEADS Center?

The Leadership, Engagement, Achievement, Diversity and Service (LEADS) Center encompasses three campus departments to bring your student the best in advising, mentoring and cultural celebrations. It encompasses the Multicultural Student Center, Native American Support Services and Student Support Services. Student Support Services offers programming designed to help low-income, first generation and/or physically or learning disabled students adjust to campus life and the rigors of academic study. The Multicultural Student Center sponsors a Peer Advisor Program, clubs and organizations, newsletter, local scholarships in addition to counseling and a resource library. The Native American Student services office is committed to providing culturally-sensitive support services to our Native American and Alaskan Native students as part of the university's mission. The LEADS Center is located in the University Union (bldg. 30, rm. 104). <http://home.nau.edu/leads/>

How does Northern Arizona University assist students who have learning or physical disabilities?

Both Disability Resources and Student Support Services assist students with learning and physical disabilities. Students with diagnosed physical, cognitive, or psychological disabilities who anticipate needing disability-related assistance should register with the Disability Resources office. Disability-related accommodations must be arranged in advance of an anticipated need, so registering early is very important. Are there specific services for international students and students who want to study abroad?

Yes. The Center for International Education (CIE) offers assistance with personal, academic, cultural, and immigration issues. All new international students are required to attend the International Student Orientation that is held at the beginning of each semester. (928) 523-2409 or CIE@nau.edu or

Money Matters

How can my student apply for financial aid?

For federal, state, and institutional aid, including Pell Grants, LEAP Grants, Federal Direct Student and Parent Loans, Perkins Loans, and Federal Work Study, your student must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) each year. This application may be completed online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Students and Parents of Dependent Students need apply for a federal PIN number at www.pin.ed.gov as this serves as your electronic signature when completing the FAFSA. Students may be required to provide additional information such as tax returns, W-2s and untaxed income statements to the Office of Student Financial Aid. Please note that the FAFSA needs to be renewed every year with updated tax information.

When are tuition and fees due?

Tuition due dates can be found at www.nau.edu/bursar. Students who do not pay tuition and fees by the semester due date will be placed on a Tuition Payment Plan and charged a fee. If you know in advance that your student would like to be placed on this five-month, interest-free payment plan, visit the Bursar's website! E-billing statements are emailed to a student's e-mail account around the seventh of the month.

My student did not qualify for grant aid, but cannot afford to pay for school. What can be done?

There are various types of loans available to assist students by spreading the cost of college over an extended period. The Federal Direct Subsidized loan is available to needy students (based on FAFSA information) and does not gain interest while the student is in school. The Federal Direct Unsubsidized Federal Stafford Loan accrues interest while the student is in school. The amount that can be borrowed through these loans depend on your student’s class level and dependency status, however no credit check is required. Non-federal loans for educational expenses are also available from commercial banks. Parents of dependent students may also qualify (based on credit) for a Federal Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students (PLUS Loan). You as a parent may borrow an amount equal to the cost of education minus any other financial aid received by the student.

My student applied for financial aid, but my financial status has changed dramatically since we filed the FAFSA. What should I do?

The financial aid application bases your eligibility on the previous year's tax information. If circumstances change, such as loss of income, loss of employment, divorce or death in the family, you may have your eligibility reevaluated. Please complete a Parent/Student Contribution Appeal Form located at www.nau.edu/finaid click on Printable Forms. Please submit the form, letter and any supporting documentation to the Financial Aid Office. Office of Financial Aid at (928) 523-4951.

What kinds of insurance needs will my student have?

Fronske Health Center offers a supplemental health plan to help students and their parents plan for medical expenses. For less than most insurance company’s annual deductibles and co-pays you can purchase the Gold Plan. The Gold Plan offers \$5.00 primary and specialty office visits. Lab work, x-rays and procedures, ordered by Fronske providers, are included at no additional expense. For students that need major medical insurance, an optional health insurance plan is also available through Fronske Health Center. This is a large group health plan covering students attending the three Arizona universities. www.nau.edu/Fronske or 928-523-6343.

You may want to insure your student’s personal property or see if your homeowners insurance policy covers it. If your student is living in an apartment, renter’s insurance might be a good idea. Auto liability insurance is required by law in Arizona.

Can you tell me more about the Mountain Campus Express card?

Mountain Campus Express (MCE) is a student’s key to on-campus, non-dining purchases. It is a pre-paid debit card, providing a way to pay for a wide variety of student services. MCE is a convenient way for students to make purchases without carrying cash and for parents to fund school related expenses from home. <http://home.nau.edu/naucard/>

Planning for the Future – The Gateway Student Success Center

What types of services are offered in the Gateway Student Success Center?

In addition to academic advising, the Gateway offers a variety of services to help students as they prepare for the world of work including: career counseling; internship searches, career-related summer/part-time jobs; job search process, including resume review and mock interviews; and the coordination of on-campus interview opportunities with employers from around the country. <http://www4.nau.edu/gateway/>

How do students find jobs when they graduate?

Gateway Student Success Center advisors are available to work individually with your student to design a tailored job search plan. Gateway hosts *Gateway Connects*, the on-line recruiting system. Since this system lists all on/off campus student employment opportunities as well as degree/career positions from across the country, students are encouraged to begin a profile their freshman year. Gateway also has job listings not posted on-line, coordinates on-campus interview schedules with visiting employers, and hosts Career Fairs to connect students with potential employers.

Resources for Parents of First-Year Students

What kinds of issues might our son or daughter struggle with during the first year of college?

The first year will be a year of excitement and of trepidation, too. There will be many new adventures and challenges both academically and personally. The best thing you can do is to assist your student in finding balance in life. You have laid a terrific foundation of values and support. Now you need to let your student practice these and build his or her own identity and independence. Trust your student to make the right choices and find their path in life.

What can we do to support our student during this coming year?

Remind your student that you are there for him/her emotionally. Send cards and little gifts to remind him/her that you are there (there is nothing worse than an empty mail box!). Ask specific questions but be careful as too many questions might be seen as your concern that she/he can't handle new challenges. Your words and actions will demonstrate that you are "there," and that you trust and respect his/her ability to handle the tough adjustment.

What if I haven't heard from my student for longer than our agreed upon time?

You may choose to contact the Residence Hall Director (RHD) and ask him/her to check in on your student. The RHD is trained to be subtle in such circumstances. If you are worried about your student's safety, you should contact NAUPD directly at (928) 523-3000.

What if my student seems depressed?

If it appears that your student is suffering from more than a mild case of homesickness, or if you have questions about the signs of depression (or other illnesses), you can consult with the Counseling Center at (928) 523-2261. For psychological emergencies after office hours, a counselor is available for consultations and can be contacted through the same telephone number.

Safety on Campus

Is the campus safe?

While Flagstaff and our campus tend to be a quiet community where violent crime is a rare event, no community is completely crime-free. It is always wise to use common sense precautions regarding personal safety no matter where you live. Encourage your student to be aware of their surroundings and to take advantage of the safety escort service provided by the NAU Police Department (NAUPD) by calling 523-3611. The campus has “blue phones” or emergency phones with a direct push-button line to the police dispatchers. Students can push the button on one phone, run to the next and push the button and so on. The police will be able to trace the route and meet the student.

Are the residence halls safe?

Freshman Connection residence halls each have a staff person working the front desk on a 24-hour basis. Upperclass halls have varying front-desk hours. Each hall, with the exception of apartment style and family housing require NAUCard access for all exterior doors. Remind your student not to prop open any exterior doors. Resident assistants make rounds on the floors, and the NAUPD officers patrol the common areas of the residence halls as part of the campus patrol duties. Given these safety measures, the residence halls are reasonably safe places to live. The NAU Police Department web site nau.edu/police contains a number of tip sheets on issues from residence hall room safety to identity theft tips. Please take a look at this valuable information and share it with your student.

Transportation

Can my student bring a car to campus as a freshman?

Yes, students are allowed to have vehicles on campus. It is often easier to ride a bike, take the shuttle or walk on campus than it is to try to drive to each class. Parking permits can be purchased on line. For more information: nau.edu/parking or (928) 523-3591.

How and where does my student register her/his bike?

Students must register their bikes for \$1 through the Flagstaff Police Department located at 911 E Sawmill Rd, Flagstaff.

Is there a campus shuttle system?

The Mountain Campus Transit (MCT) provides travel at no charge. <http://home.nau.edu/parking/mct.asp> or (928) 523-5052.

Is there a shuttle service for students with disabilities?

Yes. Students with disabilities requiring shuttle service may contact Disability Resources, Northern Arizona University, PO Box 5633, Flagstaff, AZ 86001-5633, or call (928) 523-8773. Please visit the Disability Resources website at nau.edu/dr for disability documentation criteria for this service. Transportation arrangements can be made to meet special times and needs.
